## Note

The following summary Table, produced daily, provides traffic trend information derived from a small sample set of traffic counters located on the national road network.

The information below covers the morning period from 7am until 10am. The trend for car traffic from this period of the day generally correlates closely with the overall daily trend in car traffic at each location.

## **Introductory Remarks**

- From Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> April, an upward trend in car traffic volumes became apparent. In response, daily traffic figures were provided by TII from 29<sup>th</sup> April in order to more closely monitor traffic trends. Traffic figures were measured from 7am to 10am so as to provide an early indicator each day.
- Weekly heavy goods vehicle traffic had remained largely stable and accordingly the daily figures provided were for cars only.
- The changes recorded day-to-day are not cumulative they compare only the current day's figures versus the same day in the previous week and the same day last year.
- With the introduction of countrywide Level 3 restrictions from midnight on Friday 9th October, TII has again reverted to providing a daily update.
- From Friday 16<sup>th</sup> October, following the introduction of Level 4 restrictions in the border counties of Cavan, Monaghan and Donegal, counters close to the border on the N2, N3, N13, N15 and N16 have been added.
- Since Thursday 22<sup>nd</sup> October, Level 5 restrictions have been in place countrywide.

## Daily Data for Monday 9th November

- Today's car traffic figures generally show a continuation of the growth experienced last week following the end of the mid-term school break. Overall across a majority of the traffic counters volumes are returning to the levels experienced before the implementation of Level 3 restrictions.
- Overall, car traffic today is typically down by between -18% and -49% of the volumes of one year ago, across the sampled traffic counters.
- Car traffic just south of the Northern Ireland Border on the N1 at Jonesboro shows an increase today of 6% as compared with Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> November and a decrease of -28% since the start of the Level 3 restrictions on 5<sup>th</sup> October. In overall terms, this counter exhibits the greatest reduction in response to Level 3 and subsequently Level 5 restrictions being implemented.
- In the case of the non-motorway border counter sites, traffic volumes today show an increase of between 6% and 25% as compared with Monday of last week. The changes in car traffic volumes since the application of Level 3 restrictions ranges from 11% on the N3 north of Belturbet to -11% on the N2 north of Monaghan and on the N16 east of Manorhamilton. It should be noted that traffic volumes at the N2, N3, N14, N15 and N16 counters are lower than at the motorway traffic counters and are likely to display wider fluctuations in traffic figures than other traffic counters.
- With the exception of the N7 at Citywest, car traffic volumes on the radial routes into Dublin this morning show an increase as compared with Monday of last week. Car traffic is down 9% on the N7 at Citywest and is up +8% on the M4 at Celbridge-Maynooth, 3% on the M1 at Swords to Airport and +2% on the M11 at Bray. The reduction at Citywest is likely to be due to a number of traffic incidents inbound on the route this morning which caused substantial delays to traffic. Comparisons with the same day prior to the start of the Level 3 restrictions on 5<sup>th</sup> October are as follows: down -16% on the N7 at Citywest, -13% on the M11 at Bray, -8% on the M4 at Celbridge-Maynooth, and -7% on the M1 at Swords to Airport.
- The M50 (N3 Navan Road to N4 Galway Road) shows a 5% increase as compared with Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> November. This reflects the general increase in peak time car traffic volumes on the radial approaches to the city today.

In the case of the regional cities there is a modest increase in car traffic volumes this morning as compared with Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> November. The traffic volume changes are as follows: M9 Waterford 6%, N40 Cork 4%, N6 Bóthar na dTreabh Galway 3% and M7 Limerick 2%. Comparisons with the same day prior to the start of the Level 3 restrictions on 5th October are as follows: N6 Bóthar na dTreabh Galway 0%, N40 Cork -7%, M9 Waterford -8% and M7 Limerick -10%.
